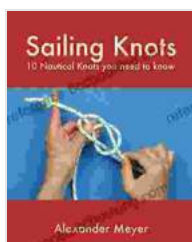

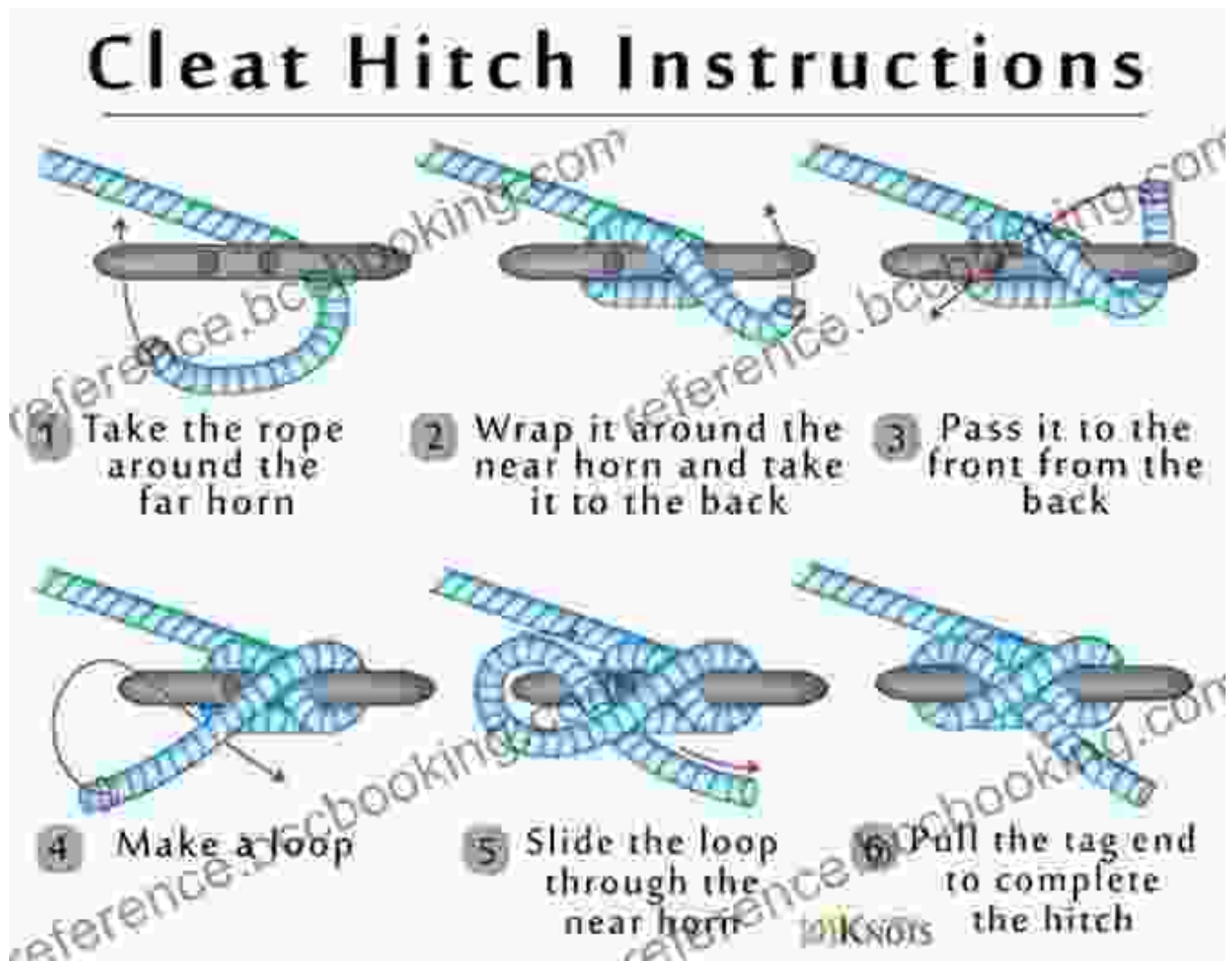
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Instructions:

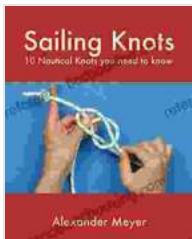

The rolling hitch is a knot that is used to secure a line



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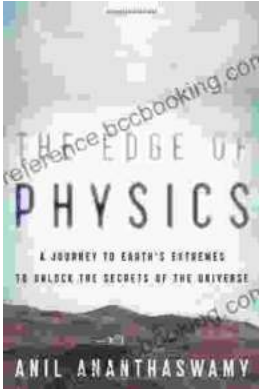
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
