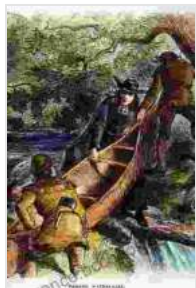

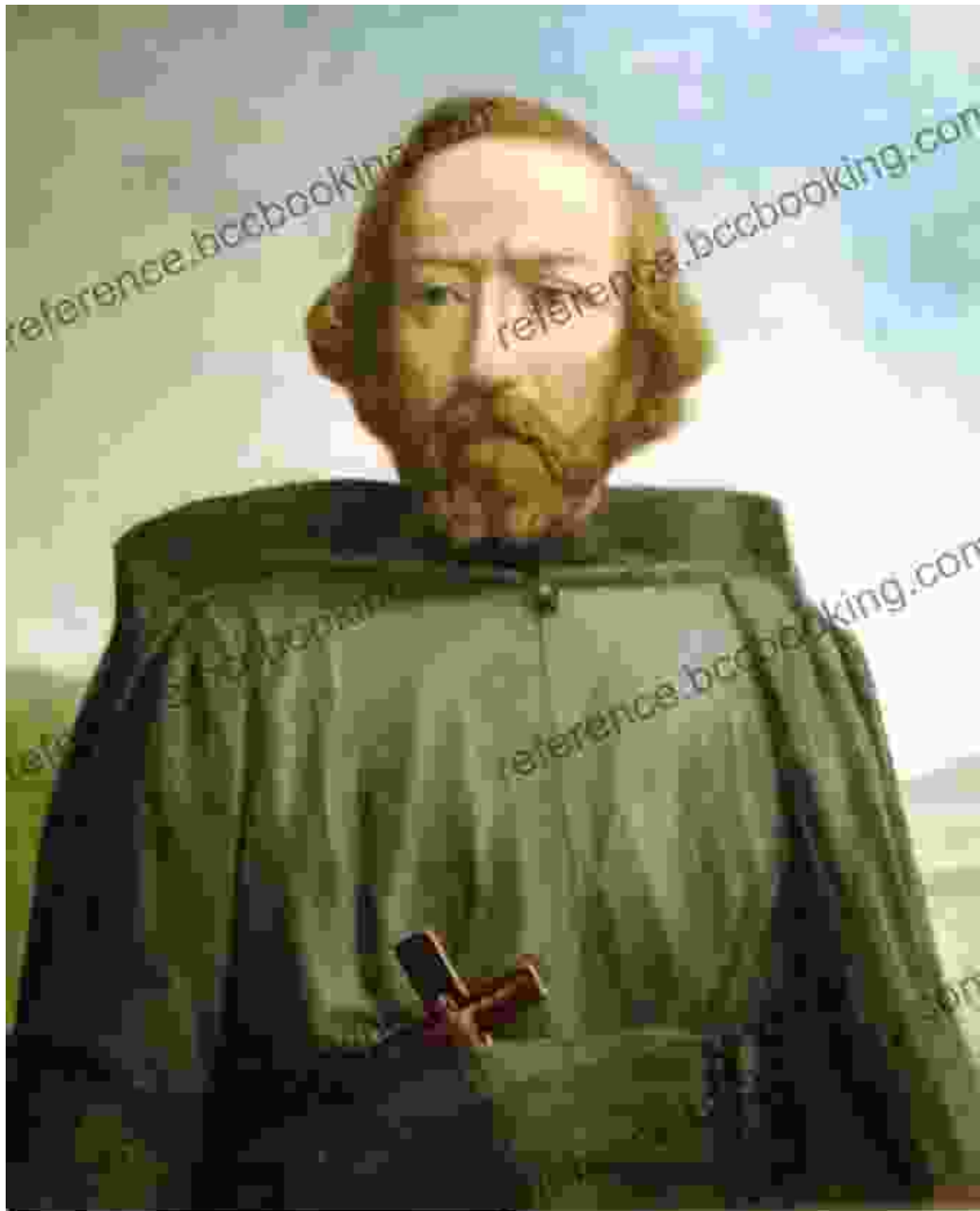

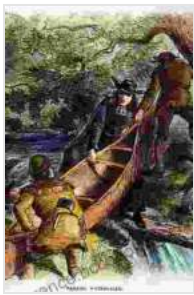
Later lives

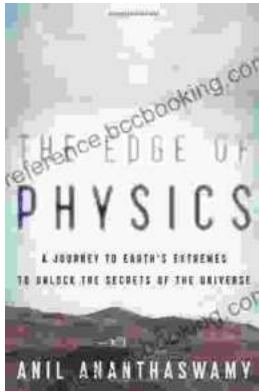
