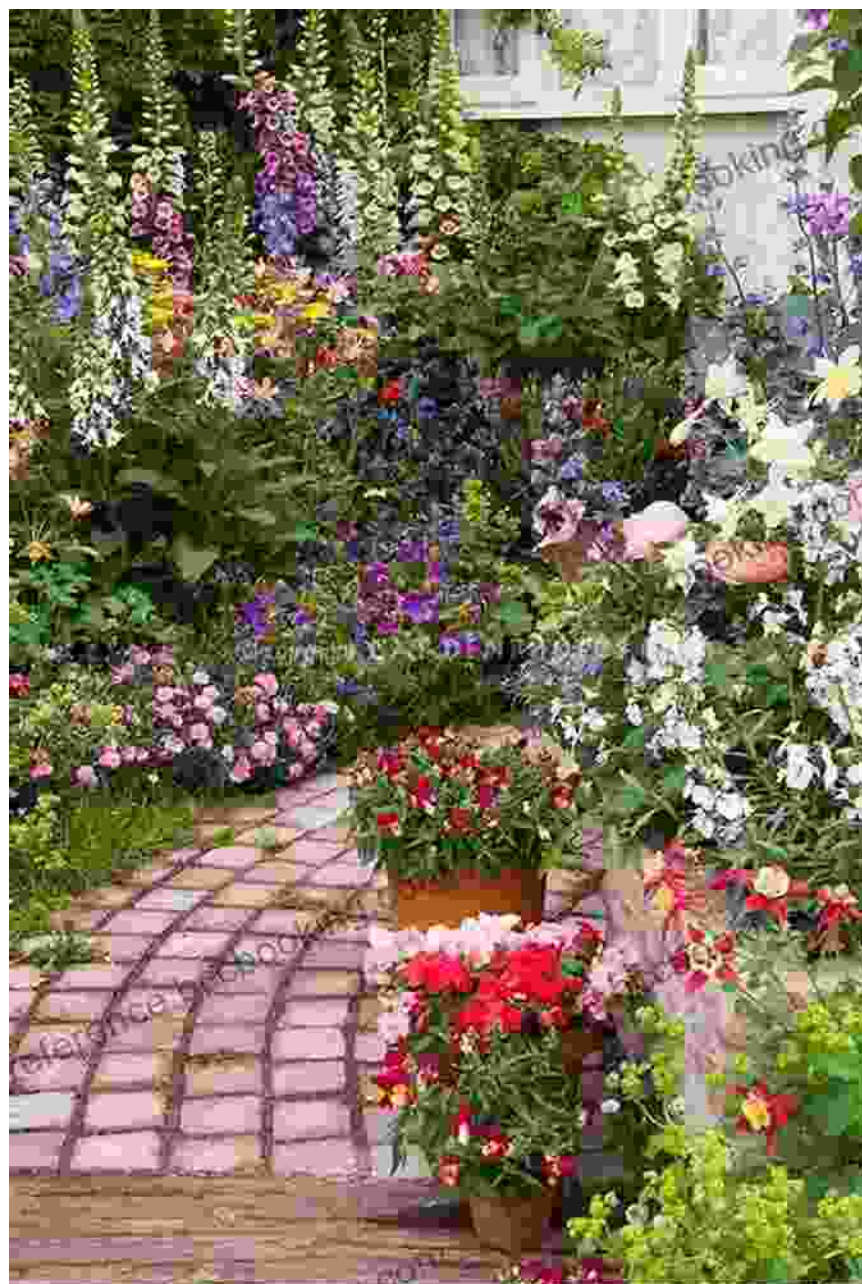

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|  <p>Rose <i>Rosa</i></p> <p>Rose comes from French, translating to "pink". Love, passion.</p> |  <p>Sunflower <i>Helianthus</i></p> <p>Named after its tendency to turn its face the sun. <i>Helianthus</i> comes from Greek <i>helios</i> "sun" and <i>anthos</i> "flower". Adoration, loyalty, and longevity.</p> |  <p>Gerbera Daisy <i>Gerbera jamesonii</i></p> <p>Named after Franziska Gerber, the German botanist who helped discover them. Impudence, cheerfulness, joy.</p> |  <p>Lily <i>Lilium</i></p> <p>Derived from Latin <i>lilio</i>, which may have come from a corrupted pronunciation of a word from an extinct Indo-European language. Purity, devotion, restored innocence, the church.</p> |
|  <p>Orchid <i>Orchis</i></p> <p>From the Greek <i>orkhis</i> meaning "testicle," because of the shape of some orchids' spots. Fertility, elegance, luxury.</p> |  <p>Hydrangea <i>Hydrangea macrophylla</i></p> <p>From Greek <i>hydra</i> "water" and <i>ganos</i> "glaze" or vessel, after the shape of its seed pods. Elegance, modesty, understanding.</p> |  <p>Tulip <i>Tulipa</i></p> <p>From French <i>tulipe</i>, tracing back to the Persian word <i>talband</i> "herb" after the shape of the bloom. True love, hope, royalty.</p> |  <p>Daisy <i>Bellis perennis</i></p> <p>Old English <i>degen's eye</i>, "day's eye," because it opens in the morning and closes at night. Sincerity, purity, motherhood, new beginnings.</p> |
|  <p>Carnation <i>Dianthus caryophyllus</i></p> <p>Some scholars believe it comes from "popercation," as it was one of the flowers used for Greek ceremonial crowns. Love, admiration, good fortune.</p> |  <p>Snapdragon <i>Antirrhinum</i></p> <p>Resembles the face of a dragon that opens and closes its mouth when lightly squeezed. Docility, gracefulness, determination.</p> |  <p>African Violet <i>Saintpaulia</i></p> <p>Named after its native habitat and true violet hue. The genus name honors Baron Walter von Saint Paul Illow, the first man to collect the seeds and help popularize them during the Victorian era. Sincere wisdom, faithfulness, royalty.</p> |  <p>Anemone/Windflower <i>Anemone</i></p> <p>From the Greek <i>anemos</i> "blast of the wind." The Anemone is the wind's messenger. Wanderlust, against evil, or all wishes. Red: Death or broken love.</p> |

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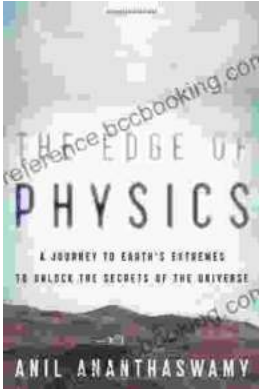
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
